

The websites listed below are starting points for possible current continuing education classes, courses, seminars, workshops, and other events. They are not exhaustive and are provided for your information as an example of the many resources that are available. The Diocese does not endorse any of these sites. In addition, you might consult the websites of individual dioceses for other continuing education opportunities (e.g. Diocese of Texas).

The TEC web site at <http://www.episcopalchurch.org/> when searched with the term "Continuing Education" usually yields 75-100 items; some are too specific courses/classes/seminars, but most are not. The site is updated periodically but there are courses, etc., listed that may be completed by the date you query the site.

Numerous websites feature continuing education opportunities. Some include the following:

- The Alban Institute is a nonprofit, nondenominational membership organization that focuses on strengthening local congregations and their leaders. Go to <http://www.alban.org/learning.aspx>

- Cathedral College, formerly the College of Preachers, offers 15-20 weeklong conferences each year, and it sustains a visiting faculty of 30 or so scholars and preachers who represent the Anglican Communion, the Episcopal Church and other mainline denominations.
